Survey of 524 nursing home providers highlights persistent staffing and economic crisis



Workforce

The vast majority of nursing homes are experiencing staffing shortages and difficulties in hiring additional staff. Providers are concerned about being able to comply with a potential federal staffing mandate.




84% of nursing homes facing moderate to high levels of staffing shortages






45% of nursing homes say their overall workforce situation has gotten worse since mid-2022






96% of nursing homes are experiencing difficulty hiring staff






More than 9 out of 10 nursing home providers have increased staff wages and offered bonuses






A lack of interested or qualified candidates is the biggest obstacle for nursing homes in hiring new staff.






More than half of nursing homes are having to limit new admissions due to staffing shortages.






More than two-thirds of nursing homes are concerned about having to close their facilities over staffing woes.






Nearly all nursing home providers are concerned about being able to meet a potential federal staffing mandate.

Nursing home providers' biggest concern with a federal staffing mandate is finding staff




COVID-19 Pandemic

83% of nursing homes say the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency should be extended



We are entering a new normal.


COVID is no longer an issue for us, and we should be able to return to the ways things were before the pandemic.

More than half of nursing homes are operating at a loss






More than half of nursing homes say they can't sustain operations at the current pace for more than one year
